Cublington offers an excellent spot for stargazing in the winter months. The combination of rural tranquillity and low light pollution makes it an ideal location for observing the night sky. Winter often brings clearer skies due to lower humidity and colder air, which means less atmospheric distortion. This makes stars and constellations sharper and more vibrant. The crisp winter air also reduces the chances of haze or clouds, leading to ideal stargazing conditions. But that's not all - Cublington is situated away from much of the bright lights of larger towns and cities, providing a darker sky ideal for astronomy.

The village is surrounded by fields and rolling countryside, offering plenty of open ground for setting up a telescope or simply lying back on a blanket to watch the stars. With little to no local infrastructure that disrupts the view, it's easy to get a wide-angle view of the night sky from, say, North Field. The peaceful surroundings make it easier to focus on the stars without distraction.



So, what can we see right now? Winter brings some of the most iconic constellations into view. The constellation of Orion, with its distinctive belt of three stars, dominates the winter sky. Additionally, Gemini, Taurus and the Pleiades (Seven Sisters) star cluster are visible, while the Andromeda Galaxy, our nearest spiral neighbour and the furthest object you can see with

the naked eye at 2.5 million light years away, is also high in the sky at this time. We are also into the peak of sunspot activity, meaning more chances to see the magnificent Northern Lights.



Here are a few pictures I've taken over the last few months — all you need is a camera with a timed shutter opening (up to 10 seconds is most useful) and tripod. If you can get yourself an automatic controller (very cheap on Amazon), you can take a lot of shots and start using free online software to produce stunning pictures.






If you want to do some stargazing rather than photography, a pair of binoculars will also start to open up the cosmos for you. Now you can see the craters on the moon, the moons of Jupiter, the Great Nebula in Orion and the Andromeda Galaxy in all their glory. (A little tip — if you can mount your binoculars on a tripod, it'll make things a little easier.) It's a great way to start finding your way around the night sky.




SPOTTED!





LATEST UPDATES

North Field Update

It's been a busy few weeks for the North Field volunteers doing maintenance tasks and planting trees which have been donated buy local residents. A new gate post has been fitted to the main gate

to Northfield and the side rail fencing on both sides has been replaced, the stone path by the side gate on Stewkley Road has been extended. Donated trees which have been planted include a walnut tree, a copper beech, a crab apple, a rowan, three desert apples, a holly, a flowering cherry and a fruiting cherry.

Conservation Volunteers have offered 50 'feed the birds' hedging whips to North Field which will be delivered in early January. A grant has been submitted to The Tree Council for funding for some 'more mature

trees' including silver birch, field maple, crab apple, holly, and rowan trees, also some soft fruit bushes for the community orchard. A decision is expected early in the new year; two previous grants have





been successful, hopefully this one will be too. Discussions have taken place with grant funders in regard to a storage container for North Field, with the grant application submitted by the time The Crier goes to print. This will make life for the volunteers much easier as equipment is currently stored in various garages around the village. Once we have a secure storage unit, we can explore grant funding for a rough cut mower or flail mower for use on North Field.

Dates for working groups are listed below, the 11th January will be a community planting morning, to plant the 'feed the birds' hedging whips, I do hope you will be able to join us and the refreshments afterwards. The field is quite wet, so either wearing wellies or stout boots is strongly recommended.

Working groups finish with hot drinks and bacon/sausage rolls. All are welcome to drop in to the pavilion for refreshments.

Sloe Gin Recipe -

Competition Friday 24th January at the Orchard Pop Up Pub

There are lots of different views on when to pick sloes, some say they need a frost, some say put them in the freezer. Some say they need pricking with a pin all over (I used to do this which really hurts when you miss the sloe so gave up that practice). Some people say you need good quality gin and others say any cheap gin will do. There is no right or wrong way just different ways.

The actual making of sloe gin is very easy, you need a jar, some sloes, some sugar and don't forget some gin. Half fill your jar with sloes, add some sugar (the amount depends on the size of your jar and how sweet you want your liqueur – remember you can always add more sugar at the decanting stage) and then top with gin. Shake everyday if you remember for about 10 days, then leave in the cupboard for as long as you can. Strain off the sloes – we then filter ours through a coffee filter – taste, sweeten if necessary – bottle and enjoy. If you make it now it should be ready for the sloe gin competition but will definitely be ready for next years competition if you can leave it that long.






Epiphany

Have you ever had an Epiphany? The word Epiphany' is described in the Cambridge Dictionary as a moment when you suddenly feel that you understand, or suddenly become conscious of, something that is very important to you. It can also refer to a powerful religious experience.

This year Epiphany begins on Sunday 5 th January and lasts until Sunday 2nd February. During the season of Epiphany the church ponders a number of Epiphanies...

First, we recall the story the 'Magi' in the Bible, sometimes referred to as the "Three Wise Men". The number three comes from their presenting three gifts to the infant Jesus of gold, frankincense and myrrh. But in fact the Bible doesn't say how many Magi there were. The tradition in the Syriac Church of the East is that there were actually twelve Magi! Neither were they necessarily men. The Magi were a priestly caste from Persia who could be women or men. The surprising part of the story is that it was these priests from a different faith were the first to recognise and worship Jesus before he had done anything remarkable. This was a moment of Epiphany.

A week later we remember the dramatic moment when the grown up Jesus was revealed to be the Son of God at his public baptism. This epiphany was dramatically experienced by John the Baptist, and some of those around him, as hearing God's audible voice from the heavens.

On the third week we remember Saint Paul's epiphany. This was after Jesus's crucifixion. A firebrand both before and after his epiphany Paul, or Saul as he was previously called, was on a mission to destroy the new Christian sect. But on his way to persecute the new believers in Damascus he had an epiphany. He was thrown to the ground during a powerful vision in which he finally recognised the risen Jesus.

At the end of Epiphany we remember the presentation of Jesus as a baby in the Temple, where an elderly man named Simeon and a prophet called Anna recognised Jesus as God's salvation for 'all peoples', and a 'light to the Gentiles'. Jesus isn't just the for the Jewish nation but for everybody in the whole world.

Epiphanies come in different shapes and sizes and at different times of life. The main characteristic is that they are unexpected and life changing. I would encourage you to be open to the unexpected this Epiphany. My prayer, as a priest living amongst you, is that you will experience an Epiphany, a deep realisation of who Jesus the Son of God is, his love, his light and his salvation for you.



TASTY RECIPE CREAMY MUSHROOM SOUP

This is a very tasty and easy soup, any mushrooms will work well in this recipe. If I see mushrooms reduced in the supermarket I will quite often buy them and make soup. Freezes well.

Ingredients:

1 onion (finely chopped)3 cloves of garlic700g of mushrooms (chopped)750ml of vegetable stock

Melt some butter or oil in a large saucepan. Add the onion and cook gently for 10 minutes, add the garlic and mushrooms and continue to cook until the mushrooms have given out their liquid. Pour in the stock and season with salt & pepper, bring to the boil and simmer for 15 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat and blitz the soup either with a stick blender or in a blender, the soup needs blitzing thoroughly to make as smooth as possible.

Reheat if necessary and add a little crème fraiche or cream into the bowl when serving.

- A gap in the market only two other clubs in Buckinghamshire offer this
- How the sessions will look weekly from May to August
- Training and match play, culminating in a disability cricket festival at the Orchard Ground on bank Holiday Monday, 25 th August featuring teams from Buckinghamshire and neighbouring counties
- Funding we want this to be free to participants so will be seeking outside funding, from sporting bodies, public grants, corporate sponsors and elsewhere
- Volunteering we need coaches, safeguarding officers, people to organise hospitality, fundraisers
- Marketing we plan to engage with local press, hospital radio, SEN schools.

Orchard Ground & Morth Field

As 2024 comes to an end and we have the first dusting of snow in Cublington, it is time for the Orchard Ground Committee to take stock of what has been yet another eventful year.

As always, the success of the Orchard Ground project is a testament to the volunteering of committee members, villagers, club members, Parish Councillors, and wider supporters.

The first success of the year was Jackie and Jenny's trivia evening. Although the questions were somewhat dated with a 1980's vibe, it added to the fun and who knows Margaret Thatcher could still win a second term and the Band Aid single could be the Christmas number one!! A good amount of money was raised and a fun evening was had by all. We have the next one in the pipeline for next year!! Although not an event organised by the committee, the Chatty Cafe continues to make use of the pavilion throughout the year and we should be proud that the facilities can be used for something like this that gives villagers a place to meet, socialise, catch up on village gossip and have a nice cup of tea.

North Field continues to go from strength to strength and many villagers make use of this facility on a daily basis. With all the rain that we have had it is somewhat wet underfoot, but those with a good pair of wellies brave it to walk their dogs. The addition of the benches is a nice touch and is another step toward turning it from a field to a recreational area. The trees are growing well and the hawthorn hedge is becoming ever more established. We have seen the construction of the base for the storage container which will give us somewhere to keep tools - rather than the back of Martyn's car! 'Thank you' has to go to the support North Field receives from the whole village in terms of monetary donations - especially from the fete - donations of trees, benches, tools, machinery and most of all time given by the bacon-roll-fuelled working parties. Congratulations to Kaiden Gregory who was awarded his Green Blue Peter badge foe his work on North Field. (No sticky back plastic required there!). Dennis Allen's enthusiasm for getting his tools out, loading burnable waste on to a trailer and torching said waste whilst honing his inner pyromaniac is much appreciated. The gate on Stewkley Road looks immaculate and creates another route for walkers. At the end of the working parties we have to thank our team of gourmet cooks Chris, Kevin and Jenny for feeding the workers with bacon rolls which taste o-so-sweet after putting in the hard graft!!

The Ground Force day is usually considered to be the unofficial opening of the Cricket season at Orchard Ground and this year, as in previous years, it was very well attended. A big thank you has to go to Harry and Tom Gadsby who do a great job corralling Cricket Club members to pitch up and

pitch in to get everything ready for the season ahead. The Cricket Club and their grounds contractors and volunteers do a sterling job keeping the square and outfield in immaculate condition. Sadly, due to unprecedented bad weather, the pitch was severely affected by excess water and, as a result, the number of games played was reduced. I hope that we can all agree that drainage at Orchard Ground is an issue and one that needs to be dealt with, to benefit not only the Cricket Club but all users.

Harry and Tom came up with a great solution for addressing this but due to funding constraints and bad weather the drainage project hasn't yet happened. It is a significant capital project for Orchard Ground as an organisation and something that we can aim for moving forward. I would like to thank everyone who put in time trying to get this off the ground and we are definitely further forward now than we were last year. A lot of fundraising will be required but Orchard Ground will aim to support the Cricket Club in whatever way we can to complete this project.

June saw the annual village fete with fete committee under

June saw the annual village fete with fete committee under the new management of Gina Reilly. As always it was a huge success and is one of the fundraising events that makes a sizeable donation to Orchard Ground and North field. Unfortunately the Car Park turned into a mud bath but the clouds parted, Pimms was drunk and burgers devoured. The fly-past by the Red Arrows was definitely a highlight. Thank you to Gina and team for a fete well executed.

July saw the General election and potentially the last £350 we will see for five years unless the Keir Starmer government collapses. Orchard Ground has definitely benefited from the UKs political turmoil in recent years. But there will be council elections to come.

Unfortunately Orchard Ground was not successful in getting the grant to improve accessibility to the pavilion from what was formerly known as Wren. Accessibility to the pavilion is important and as a community facility this is something that we will ensure that we pursue. Alternative funding options are already being considered. Thank you Martyn for your time in putting in this grant.

August saw the closure of The Unicorn which, although has seen the village without a pub, has presented Orchard Ground with an opportunity to open its doors and give Cublington's answer to Peggy Mitchell - Miranda Gregory - the chance to be a landlady. 'The Orchard' as it has been dubbed is in its infancy but it offers potential to utilize the pavilion as a social space for the village while bringing in much needed revenue.

The drainage project has forced us to look at our finances and address some underlying issues in how the economics of Orchard Ground work. The rising costs of water and electricity due to global macro factors has been a heavy financial burden for Orchard Ground. Going forward, it was agreed that fees charged to clubs for the use of facilities will have to be looked at on an annual basis. Also, additional revenue streams will have to be found in order to balance the books - so any suggestions will be gratefully received. Orchard Ground is certainly not alone in having to make tough decisions in regard to finances. Families, businesses

and other community organisations are facing the same pressures. Over the past few years we have been incredibly fortunate with grants that we have received but there is no guarantee that these will be there in the future. As a committee we have to communicate the costs involved in simply keeping the facilities we have open to all users and how vital financial support is to the very survival of the organisation.

So now on to the Thank Yous. I will start with the committee members. Without all of your input, expertise, time, energy, enthusiasm and vision the village would not have the facility that it has and in the condition in which it is enjoyed. Liz, you do a great job keeping on top of the pounds, shillings and pence, paying suppliers, bills, taking in cheques etc. Everything is meticulously accounted for and well organised. If we need to know something financial related you answer the questions quickly and accurately. Bob, thank you for managing the bookings, welcoming hirers and ensuring that the pavilion is left in an immaculate state when they leave. Also, the effort that you put into organising the 100 Club is phenomenal. Selling tickets, distributing prizes, drawing the tickets and also running the numbers to encourage the committee to raise the cost of a ticket. I would also like to apologise for my lateness in getting the tickets that I sold to you. I know that I am the worst offender but meeting deadlines is not something that I am good at.

Jenny, as secretary, thank you for completing the minutes in a timely fashion, making sure that all the points are included and sending out agendas so that we know what to deal with at each meeting. Your talent for cooking bacon rolls is much appreciated too.

Jackie, thank you for your input on the committee, helpful suggestions and quiz mastery skills. Special thanks should also be extended for what I am told was a very successful Cabaret Night. The decision to make a donation to Orchard Ground is much appreciated.

Gary, Thank you for the Tennis Club updates, additions to AOB and the contribution that The Crier makes to letting the village know what is happening at Orchard Ground and North Field. The village would be lost without your Graphic Design skills; the new sign at the entrance looks very eye catching and is a great way to welcome users and advertise to potential users the facilities that are on offer.

Harry, you are the newest victim, sorry member of the Orchard Ground Committee - you bring down the average age considerably! I am no longer the youngest member, and as Premier League teams have youth development programs, I hope that you stay with us for many years to come. You have done a great job informing us of what has been happening in the Cricket Club and put in a lot of effort to try and get the drainage project off the ground. Your ideas are great and your enthusiasm for maintaining the pitch is impressive.

Miranda, using your creativity you managed to turn what is the magnolia box of the main hall of the pavilion into a warm, welcoming and different space as The Orchard. I don't know about everyone else, but it certainly doesn't feel like you are in the pavilion. Your help in getting the card

payment system set up in time for the fete was invaluable and helped the stalls that used them to dramatically increase their takings not only benefitting Orchard Ground but other village groups as well.

Martyn, your passion, tenacity, hard work and laser-like focus in seeking grants is astounding. You do an amazing job organizing the North Field working parties and making sure that Bob doesn't spend too much time sitting on his backside! You have set out policy documents in order to professionalize the management of the asset and the work that you are putting in to forming the charitable trust will ensure that Orchard Ground will benefit the village for many years to come. I am also told by Cllr Antosiewicz that the reports you give to the Parish Council about what the Orchard Ground Committee is working on are thorough and keep the Parish Council updated and informed. A thank you has to be extended to those who sit on the Charitable Trust committee. Reviewing the constitution, tenancy agreements, insurance policies and legislation that the charity will have to adhere to can be tedious. We had hoped to get the charity set up by the AGM, but the process is taking longer than anticipated. Pippa Cheetham, Charlie Toosey, Jenny Brown, Andy Brown, Liz Smith and Hugh Vale have all contributed immensely.

Thanks from myself on behalf of the committee has to go to the Parish Council. They all do a lot of work in the background that keeps the wheels turning. At the end of the day they are the ultimate custodians of Orchard Ground and if we ever find ourselves in difficulty they are always there to help us out.

Particular thanks has to go the Parish Council Chaiman, Cllr Antosiewicz (aka Mum!) who is always willing to listen to some of my wacky ideas of things that Orchard Ground could potentially do but always brings me back to down to earth and reminds me that we live in democracy and not a dictatorship!

Thank you to Mike Joy who, as Clerk to the Parish Council, is always on hand to answer any questions we have of a technical nature and give advice when needed. He has certainly gone above and beyond with the work he has put in to helping establish the charity.

Thanks has to go to Hugh Vale for volunteering his time, machinery and expertise to Orchard Ground. He has been involved from the very beginning and his advice is invaluable and much appreciated.

Thank you to Rosie, our cleaner does an incredible job keeping the pavilion spotlessly clean.

Thank you to Martyn Gates, our unofficial auditor who ensures that we are not syphoning money to our retirement funds.

We have a lot of work ahead of us and who knows what the future holds. Nuclear war with Russia, famine, social upheaval or another Pandemic? But we should all feel blessed that we live in a village that has the facilities which it does and the community to support them.

To end, in the words of President elect Trump, I hope that our future above all else will be bigger, better, bolder, richer, safer and stronger than it ever has been before.

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



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
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




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
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The images in this article were taken from my back garden in the High Street except for the first image of the Northern Lights, which was taken from Silver Street, looking North over the fields.
